Synod Sentences for Second Sunday after Christmas: Jesus Is the Perfect Israel



Israel and all his family went and dwelt in Egypt (Gen. 46:1–7). God made a great nation of him there, but that nation would prove unfaithful to the Lord. Therefore, the New Israel came. In fleeing the murderous Herod, our young Lord goes to Egypt (Matt. 2:13–23), that the prophecy might be fulfilled, "Out of Egypt I called my Son" (Hos. 11:1). Jesus brings to perfection what old Israel could not. He is the faithful Israel, the embodiment of the people of God. He offers His perfect and holy life in place of our own. He submits Himself to persecution and suffering in order to save us. Therefore, we should not think it

strange when we who are in Christ experience trials because of the faith (1 Pet. 4:12–19). Rather, we rejoice to share in Christ's sufferings, knowing that we will also share in His glory.




Nicene Creed






PASTORAL CARE AND HOLY COMMUNION: At The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, we celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Altar every Lord's Day. In this Sacrament, we joyfully receive Christ's true Body and Blood, under bread and wine, for the forgiveness of our sins.

As we celebrate the Sacrament, we also give public confession of our unity in the Christian faith (1 Cor. 10). Members in good standing of congregations of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and congregations in which the LCMS is in Altar/Pulpit fellowship are asked to announce themselves to the pastor prior to the service. All others are invited to speak with the pastor regarding preparation for communion fellowship with the Evangelical Lutheran Church. Those who are baptized but not receiving communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, kneeling with arms crossed at your heart.

Please be assured that we do so not out of spiritual arrogance, but rather in a sincere desire to be faithful to our Lord's command and the apostles' teaching. A Stewardship Thought for the Second Sunday after Christmas

1 Peter 4:17 – "For it is time for judgment to begin at the household of God; and if it begins with us, what will be the outcome for those who do not obey the gospel of God?" The Gospel had freed us from all fear. God the Father loves us to the ends of love, and He has sent His Son to die for us and call us into His kingdom through the rebirth of water and Spirit. Saint Peter views this not as an excuse to sin but as encouragement for godly living. The judgment of the Lord is a real event, and it applies to the household of God. As members of His household, we desire to serve Him.

A Stewardship Thought for The Feast of the Epiphany - January 6

Matt. 2:11 – "And going into the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh." For the wise men and for us, worship and offering gifts go together. An Epiphany Devotion by Rev. Wm. C. Cwirla (Sr Pr., Holy Trinity, Hacienda Heights)

Wise men came from the East to worship Him. His first worshippers were Bethlehem's shepherds. Now it is Babylon's astrologers who have come to see and worship. Jesus is Lord and Savior of all. A light to give light the Gentiles, and the glory of His people Israel. They followed a well-worn path from the East. Centuries before, the Queen of Sheba had come from the East to pay homage to David's son Solomon in all his splendor. These wise men came to see David's greater Son and to pay their homage with similar gifts fit for a king – gold, frankincense, myrrh. The Israelites had once gone into exile in Babylon; now Babylon goes to Israel to inquire, "Where is he who is born king of the Jews?"

Before there were astronomers, there were astrologers. Before Copernicus and Galileo and Kepler and the Hubble telescope and Voyager satellites there were Magi, star gazing astrologers who studied the stars not for mechanisms and models but for meaning and mystery. A star had caught their eye, a light signaling the birth of a king in Judea. God is good and gracious as He is resourceful. He uses something that would catch the astrologer's eye and serve as a pointer – a star. Where the shepherds heard the preaching of an angel, the wise men were given a star. The Israelites get an angelic preacher; the Gentiles get a star.

They followed their reason and the star to the reasonable place, Jerusalem, the king's city, and the palace of Herod, the king of the Jews, expecting to find the baby. But there was no king born to Herod's household. Reason and observation can point you in the right direction, but it can't get you to God or His Son. Science can teach us of the Genetic Code but it can know nothing of the Genetic Coder. Science can gaze at the stars and conceive of the Big Bang that began all things

in the beginning, but it cannot know of the One who called all things out of nothing by His Word.

For that one must have the Word. The prophet Micah pointed to Bethlehem and the star confirmed it. There they found the Child with His mother, no longer in a manger, now in a house. Filled with joy, the bowed down and worshipped Him with their gifts of gold, incense, and myrhh.

They came seeking a king; they encountered the King of kings. They came because of a star; they encountered the Morning Star. They came as wise men; they encountered the One who is God's Wisdom come down from above. They came seeking a child; they encountered God's Child, His

only-begotten Son, the Savior of all. They came having seen a light in the heavens; they encountered the One who is the Light and Life of all.

God's pointers are all around us, if we dare to look. The Divine Suspect has left His fingerprints all over His creation. The heavens declare the glory of God, the skies proclaim the works of His hands. Through telescope and microscope, wise men still seek Him, not knowing whom they seek or why. Stars can bring you to Jerusalem, but the Word must guide you to Bethlehem. Reason and observation can bring you to the threshold, but only God's revelation in His Son can bring you through the door where Christ is mangered for you in the water of Baptism, the mouth of the preacher, the bread and wine of the Supper.

2Pet. 1:19 And we have the prophetic word made more sure. You will do well to pay attention to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts.

Herod was threatened and wanted to kill the Child. Warned in a dream, the wise men wisely went home by another way. They arrived in the way of King Herod, they returned in the way of King Jesus. Having seen and worshipped the King, they cannot walk the old way again. Old Adam is always threatened when his throne is threatened. Herod must die; Christ must rise. We must decrease, He must increase, each and every baptismal day until the morning dawns and the Day breaks forth in light.

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.

Epiphany: The Christmas of the Gentiles

The Festival of the Epiphany of Our Lord is one of the four major festivals of Christ in the church year. The other three are Christmas, Easter, and Ascension. The word "epiphany" means "manifestation." The theme of the Festival of the Epiphany, which commemorates the visit of the Magi to the boy Jesus, is the *manifestation* of Christ to the gentiles.

God had established his chosen nation from the descendants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. But most of us who are reading this article are, according to our ethnicity and family heritage, gentiles. The patriarchs of Israel are not our ancestors. But this does not mean that God forgot about our forbears, or about us. When the Messiah of Israel was finally sent, he was sent also for us.

When Jesus was born, the angel announced to the Jewish shepherds outside of Bethlehem that their Savior had been born. And they then walked the few miles that they needed to traverse, to find him and worship him. But Jesus came into the world not only for those who were close to him – religiously, culturally, and geographically. He came also for those who were far away. He came also for our ancestors, and for us.

The story of Epiphany is the story of the star announcing to the Magi in the East – many, many miles from Bethlehem – that also *their* Savior had been born. And so they launched out on a major trek, traversing deserts and plains, crossing rivers, and exposing themselves to all kinds of danger, so that they could find, and worship, the Redeemer of the entire human race. Epiphany is, in a sense, the Christmas of the gentiles. It is, in a sense, *our* Christmas.

Those in the world today, who are invited by the story of Epiphany to come and worship Christ today, are indeed often very far away from him when they receive that invitation. Their hearts are enslaved by the fear of death. Their minds are darkened by the satanic lies they believe. Their wills are perverted by a self-destructive yearning after sin. Their consciences are twisted by a hatred for that which is their only hope. But these gentiles of today are nevertheless invited by the star of Bethlehem to come and find Jesus, and to worship Jesus, as he makes himself available to us today in his Word and sacraments. Even if they must come, as it were, from a great distance, they are still invited to come. The star of the gospel draws them, and energizes them, to come. That star invites all gentiles – and all Jews as well! – to receive Christ into their hearts, minds, wills, and consciences. The star offers to all gentiles – and to all Jews! – the liberation, the enlightenment, the purification, and the peace that only Jesus can give.

The visit of the Magi was an important event in the life of Christ on earth. The Festival of the Epiphany is, accordingly, an important observance in the church year for us. Especially if you are a gentile, go to church on Epiphany. Worship the Savior who was sent for you, and who has been manifested to you. This is your festival! This is your Christmas! – *Pr.
