
Thank You for Your Church Offerings

A Stewardship Thought



James 1:22 – "But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves." The Word of God is not merely to be heard, but to be received and believed. Our faith is implanted and strengthened by the Word of God. And as Luther said, "Oh, it is a living, busy, active, mighty

thing, this faith. And so, it is impossible for it not to do good works incessantly." James reminds us of this – and encourages us to examine our lives and come to repentance where we can see that we are not living out our faith in sincerity.

The Latin names for the Sundays in Easter

are from the first word of the Introit, with the exception of today.

Rogate comes from the Latin *rogare* which means "to ask," a reference to the strong theme of prayer in the Propers for today. In ancient practice, the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday between Rogate Sunday and the Ascension of our Lord were known as Rogation Days. These days of early summer were times of special prayer for the protection of the crops.

The Church has observed these as typically days of fasting and repentance in preparation for our Lord departing from His earthly ministry and entrusting The Gospel and The Sacraments to His Apostles.

It is appropriate, during any time of fasting and repentance to abstain from lavish entertainment, to devote more time to prayer, and to give alms to the orphans, widows, and foreigners.

The Introit for Rogate, "With the voice of singing declare ye, and tell this: utter it even to the end of the earth..." is from Isaiah 48.20, a joyful proclamation of the freedom of Israel from the Babylonian captivity, and of God's gracious deliverance of His people. The Gospel for Rogate, like those for the preceding Sundays—Cantate and Jubilate, all point to the Ascension, and hence point the eyes of the faithful to our risen Lord's eternal reign in heaven.
