

Seating: In any open (non-taped) pew on either side of the center aisle.




If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples

Those who are baptized but not receiving communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, kneeling with arms crossed at your heart.

Please be assured that we do so not out of spiritual arrogance, but rather in a sincere desire to be faithful to our Lord's command and the apostles' teaching. 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THIS WEEK'S NOTES

What is This Feast We Celebrate Today?



During the dark days of the Middle Ages, the truth of God's Word became hidden. The church of that day was not teaching that we are saved by Jesus' death and resurrection. Instead, people were told that they needed to try and earn their way to heaven—or worse, that they had to buy their way to heaven. The truth of God's Word was rejected, and the traditions of men put in its place. Dr. Martin Luther, a catholic monk and professor, changed all that on October 31, 1517, when he nailed 95 Theses (statements for debate) on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. He said that the Bible should be our only

source of teaching, not man-made traditions. He showed that God saved us by grace alone, and that grace comes to us through faith. Today, we continue to profess the same truths as the true Christian church all throughout the ages, the truths that the Reformation again focused the church on: By Scripture alone, By Grace alone, By Faith alone. To God be the glory for revealing these eternally life changing truths to us. <u>Our Reformation prayer</u>: *Lord, keep us steadfast in Your Word.* Amen.

Synod Sentences for The Feast of the Reformation

The Son of God Has Set Us Free from Sin and Death by His Grace



"Wisdom is justified by her deeds" (Matt. 11:19), and the true Wisdom of God, Christ Jesus the incarnate Son, justifies us by His deeds. He prepares His way by the preaching of repentance, but He has suffered the violence of the Law and voluntarily handed Himself over to violent men, that we might eat and drink with Him in His Kingdom and "remain in the house forever" (John 8:35). For He is "a friend of tax collectors and sinners" (Matt. 11:19), and He has rescued us by His grace from the

slavery of sin and death. By the proclamation of His eternal Gospel "to those who dwell on earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people" (Rev. 14:6), "the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law" (Rom. 3:21), "that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus" (Rom. 3:26). And by hearing the Gospel of Christ Jesus, "whom God put forward as a propitiation by His blood, to be received by faith" (Rom. 3:25), "you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:31–32).

The Luther Seal: Summary of the Gospel

The most enduring symbol of the Lutheran Reformation is the seal that Luther himself designed to represent his theology. By the early 1520s, this seal begins to appear on the title page of Luther's works.

Here is how Luther himself explained its meaning:

First, there is a black cross in a heart that remains its natural color. This is to remind me that it is faith in the Crucified One that saves us. Anyone who believes from the heart will be justified (Romans 10:10). It is a black cross, which mortifies and causes pain, but it leaves the heart its natural color. It doesn't destroy nature, that is to say, it does not kill us but keeps us alive, for the just shall live by faith in the Crucified One (Romans 1:17). The heart should stand in the middle of a white rose. This is to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace—it puts the believer into a white, joyous rose. Faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John 14:27). This is why the rose must be white, not red. White is the color of the spirits and angels (cf. Matthew 28:3; John 20:12). This rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that a joyful spirit and faith is a beginning of heavenly, future joy, which begins now, but is grasped in hope, not yet fully revealed. Around the field of blue is a golden ring to symbolize that blessedness in heaven lasts forever and has no end. Heavenly blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and better than any possessions, just as gold is the most valuable and precious metal.

Following are various versions of the seal as it has appeared over time since the Reformation.

The first version was used in Luther's writings in the 1520s for the first time, and was in black and white, with Luther's initials. A colorized rendition of the seal began appearing



as printers began to include color images in Luther's works. Each one was laboriously painted by hand. (s)

About the Front Cover Art

The crucified Christ is in the center of the panel. His figure is repeated on the left side conquering an evil demon and death. In the background, a scene of the Expulsion from Eden reminds viewers of the presence of sin and the subsequent need for salvation. Immediately on the right of Christ, St John the Baptizer points one of his fingers at the central figure and the index finger from his other hand to the Agnus Dei, the Lamb of God. Next to the Baptizer stands Lucas Cranach the Elder. A stream of blood from Christ's side flows directly upon his forehead. On the far right, Luther points to a passage from his German translation of the Bible concerning Christ's redemptive blood, which frees all believers from sin. In the background, the Old Testament tale of Moses and the Brazen Serpent and the New Testament story of the Annunciation to the Shepherds are depicted as examples of God's grace.

The Weimar Altarpiece, painted for John Frederick of Saxony, was completed in 1555 by Lucas Cranach the Younger after the death of his father. It still occupies its original location at the high altar of the City Church of Sts Peter and Paul in Weimar. This impressive triptych has been hailed as "the single most important visual monument of German Reformation." It conveys the close ties between Luther and his protectors, the dukes of Saxony, who are represented on its inner wings of the triptych which are painted in warm reds, yellows, and oranges. John Frederick the Magnanimous of Saxony and Sybille of Cleves on the left wing and their three sons on the right wing frame the Crucifixion in the central panel.

The outer sides of the wings, seen when the triptych is closed, depicts the Baptism of Christ and the Resurrection.
