

A Note From The Organist:

Pachelbel was one of the important composers in the pre-Bach gra and his music influenced the young Bach greatly. His setting of "My Soul, Now Praise Your Maker" has the melody in the pedal on a 4-foot stop, sounding one octave higher than written, and placing it in the middle voice, while the hands surround it with rich counterpoint.

Horatio W. Parker was one of a group of American composers who settled in New England after studying in Europe, and established music libraries at Yale and Harvard. He wrote music in many forms, including a great deal of organ and choral music. His Postlude in A Major typical of the late Nineteenth Century Style.




The Words of Our Lord



<u>Lectionary Summary for the Twenty-fourth Sunday After Pentecost</u> The Gospel Prepares Us for Our Heavenly Bridegroom's Coming

The Day of the Lord is "darkness, and not light" (Amos 5:18, 20) for all who trust in their own righteousness and piety. The Lord will not accept their "burnt offerings and grain offerings," nor will He look upon their "peace offerings" (Amos 5:22). Instead, He desires a heart of faith that trusts in Him, which lets "justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream" (Amos 5:24) in love for the neighbor. In order for the "lamps" of our lives to burn brightly with such love, we must be filled with the "oil" of forgiveness through faith in our Bridegroom, Jesus Christ (Matt. 25:1–4). Therefore, as we await His coming, wisdom directs us "to the dealers" (Matt. 25:9), that is, to the ministers of His Gospel. Thus we wait upon the Lord, and we "encourage one another with these words" (1

Thess. 4:18). Waking or sleeping, we are prepared to meet Him when He comes "with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God," and "we will always be with the Lord" (1 Thess. 4:16, 17).

<u>Lutheran For Life Thoughts for the Twenty-fourth Sunday After Pentecost</u>

Like the parable's bridegroom, Jesus often meets us in unexpected moments (Matthew 25:10). He even sometimes hides in surprise pregnancies or terminal diagnoses in order to rescue and bless. So, we dare not ignore the poor and needy neighbors who cry out for deliverance (Psalm 70:1, 5) from abortion and assisted suicide. If we do indeed love the Lord's salvation, then let us say so (Psalm 70:4)!

A Snippet From 1517

Old Testament: Amos 5:18-24 (Pentecost 23: Series A)

Because Israel has turned the eschatology of the Day of the LORD into "escapism" Amos turns that notion on its head in his prophecy.

The Old Testament Lesson for this Sunday comes from the prophet Amos as written in the Book of the Twelve. The text is Amos 5:18-24 and illustrates a very common theme in Amos—a complete reversal of what is expected. Thus, the Day of the LORD will not be a bright day, but rather a dark one. Because Israel has turned the eschatology of the Day of the LORD into "escapism" Amos turns that notion on its head in his prophecy (R. Reed Lessing: Amos; Concordia Commentary Series). Note how this is not unlike the Pharisees and Sadducees of Jesus' day. They had specific expectations concerning the coming Messiah which would support and allow them to "escape" their current situation, but Jesus turns these expectations on their head. Jesus reverses them. Of course, we see the same expectation of escapism among many Christian denominations in our day. Chiliasm, millennialism, etc. all look to the return of Christ as a deliverance from this world while those "left behind" continue to suffer.

Amos' "Day of the LORD" language (also found in other prophets) is eschatological language that looks beyond the idea of the restoration of Israel. The restoration of Israel is important but only as it is connected to Messianic hope and the bodily resurrection. The Day of the LORD is not an "escape from," it is an "entry into." Ironically, those who focus on the escape end up being trapped by that which they sought to leave.

Finally, we see in this text metaphors linking us intimately into the New Testament and the Messiah. The "darkness" of the Day of the LORD connects us to the events of Good Friday and the descending darkness when Christ calls out, "It is finished." There is also the water motif in verse 24 which is connected to justice and righteousness. It points us to the Sacrament of Baptism and the life these waters bring.
